

GIPSON SPOTLIGHT

Member DEAN SALVADALENA





"There was like half of me that was not there, a big hole, and I didn't know how to fill it."

Two years ago, Dean Salvadalena moved from Maine to Everett, to live with his twin brother in Eastmont, after his longtime partner Jerome passed away.

Dean had been away for a very long time.

Dean and Gene, the oldest of four siblings, grew up in Snohomish. "I was not that coordinated. My twin brother excelled at sports. When they'd pick teams, even my brother wouldn't choose me, that's how bad I was." Young Dean always had his nose in a book, mostly geography or history, but that curiosity didn't translate to school, where he was an unenthusiastic student.

The Rotary Club of Everett opened an unexpected door for Dean. For the first time they sponsored a direct exchange program with Hiroshima, Japan. A local family would host a Japanese teenager and send one to Japan. Dean flew across the world to join the Yasumotos: Mom, Dad and 17-year-old daughter Sachiyo, while their son Motoyuki spent a year at Snohomish High School, living with the Salvadalenas.

"The thing I remember most: I learned so many stories of the flip side of the war. A lot of the Japanese people were either forced to go to war or die." Dean met survivors with burn marks, scars, disfigurements. He met their children, some of whom had suffered from radiation-related conditions. "There's always a flip side to a conflict. The people that suffered were those who were forced to fight, or live in Hiroshima or Nagasaki, and lived through this horrible experience."

At home with Japanese culture and language, Dean worked several years for a Japanese reinsurance company, living first in Greenwich Village, NYC, before moving to Brooklyn with Jerome. Outgoing and confident, Jerome drew out the naturally reserved Dean. "He gave me a lot of strength and courage to do things." They'd explore the city, go to opera, and frequent Broadway shows like Les Miserable or Sunset Boulevard. After they relocated to Maine in 1999, same sex marriage became legal in the United States, and Dean and Jerome married.

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Dean remembers those years with Jerome with a slight, wistful smile. "We loved to travel, and we traveled many places: Czech Republic, Slovakia, Hungary, Italy, Netherlands, Belgium, and Germany." They often went to the UK, and kept their distance from big travel groups, preferring instead to hire a local guide to take them off the beaten path. They had many adventures, until Jerome got sick. Dean cared for him those last years, trying to will the world to give them more days, hours, minutes.

Jerome passed on May 31st, 2023, at home, and soon Dean's twin brother Gene flew out and helped Dean pack up. Together they drove a U-Haul back to Everett.

Dean hadn't lived in Washington in 49 years.

After he settled in his brother's home – with Gene, Gene's wife, and their 93-year-old father – Dean couldn't shake the grief, the emptiness. "I didn't know what to do, but I knew I had to do something."

Last June he stopped by the Gipson Center and asked about volunteering. Gul mentioned that we needed help at the Membership Desk, and Dean has served, off and on, since that day. He also calls Bingo, attends trips, and serves on our Senior Advisory Committee.



"The best thing for me here is meeting people. A lot of people here don't have a lot in their life. You know, everyone wants to feel that they belong to something, that someone cares about them. Just to have someone say 'hi' or talk to them for a little bit, I get the impression that it's a big deal."

For Dean, serving at the Center, "...gives me a lot of joy." Dean gives that joy back, on Tuesdays and Wednesdays and every other Monday for Bingo, having found a place that, like Japan, New York or Maine, feels like home.

A huge thanks to Jim for all his hard work helping us prepare for a smooth transition and to his lovely wife Laurie for sharing him with us for so many hours!







These celebrations add depth to the Center's role in the community, and they're a reminder to keep going, keep growing, and to keep welcoming and embracing diverse and unique communities.

Most members don't see the Campfire kids, whose joyful laughter fills the hall as they run around during their programs. It's one of the highlights of my day, hearing them ask, "Lucia, can we have some candy?" or "Can I have one more?" Their excitement brings so much life to the Center, and it's moments like these that make all the hard work worthwhile.

This has never just been a "job" to me. This Center has been a bright light in my life. On a personal note, I've been through difficult times, like the passing of my mom, and coming to the Center during that period gave me hope. The smiles here and the wonderful people I work with will always hold a special place in my heart. The team I work with—Gul, Cora, and Cory—have made this place a safe and welcoming home for me, my daughter Lucianna, and my family, and I'm incredibly grateful.
